Nature's Corner

In this edition of Nature's Corner, we will be focusing on defining and describing the Certified Florida Master Naturalist program and

designation by answering some basic questions.

What is a Certified Florida Master Naturalist?

In 2001, the University of Florida developed an intensive educational program that is offered to anyone wishing to promote awareness, understanding and respect of Florida's natural world among Florida's citizens and visitors. The program is the Florida Master Naturalist Program, (FMNP), and is offered at many local extension offices and other locations around the state. FNMP is open and available to anyone and will benefit people interested in increasing their knowledge for use in education programs as volunteers, employees, ecotourism guides and others.

What all is involved in becoming a Certified Florida Master Naturalist?

To become a Certified Master Naturalist, a person must successfully complete a total of 120 hours of both class work and field experience in three core course areas. Those areas include Coastal Systems, Freshwater Systems and Upland Systems.

What does the Coastal Systems Course consist of?

This course provides instruction of basic ecology, vegetation types, habitats, wildlife and conservation issues facing Coastal Uplands, Estuarine Systems and Nearshore Marine environments. The class also focuses on society's role in Coastal Systems and environmental ethics.

What does the Freshwater Systems Course entail?

This course provides instruction on ecology, vegetation types, habitats, wildlife and conservation issues of freshwater systems including, marshes, swamps and permanent wetlands such as rivers, springs, lakes and streams. The class also addresses people's role in wetlands and environmental ethics.

What does the Uplands Systems Class offer?

The Uplands Systems Class offers the student knowledge of the different habitats, environment, wildlife and conservation issues facing the following Systems: hardwood forests, pinelands, scrub, dry prairie, urban green spaces and rangelands. Again, attention is also placed on society's role in Upland Systems and ethical considerations are made.

Now what?

As a Certified Master Naturalist, we are expected to be good ambassadors of our natural surroundings by sharing the information we have learned with neighbors, friends, family and visitors to the area. We are expected to volunteer at appropriate venues to share our knowledge so others can also pass that knowledge along.

How can I learn more?

The FMNP also offers short courses on various special topics. Those include and are not limited to Conservation Science, Wildlife Monitoring, Environmental Interpretation and Habitat Evaluation. You can also refer to the FMNP program through their website at www.masternaturalist.ifas.ufl.edu. In addition, if you have any particular questions or should an issue arise, feel free to contact one of us as we may be able to help.

It is our goal to offer an interactive program to anyone interested in learning more about the unique area here in The Hammocks.
